Hi,

You will find the flyer for the spring party in this newsletter, please sign up... we need a head count for the golf and food being supplied by the club. The decision to have everyone bring their own beverages was made from concerns expressed about the club supplying any alcohol and what to do with the left over from the party. 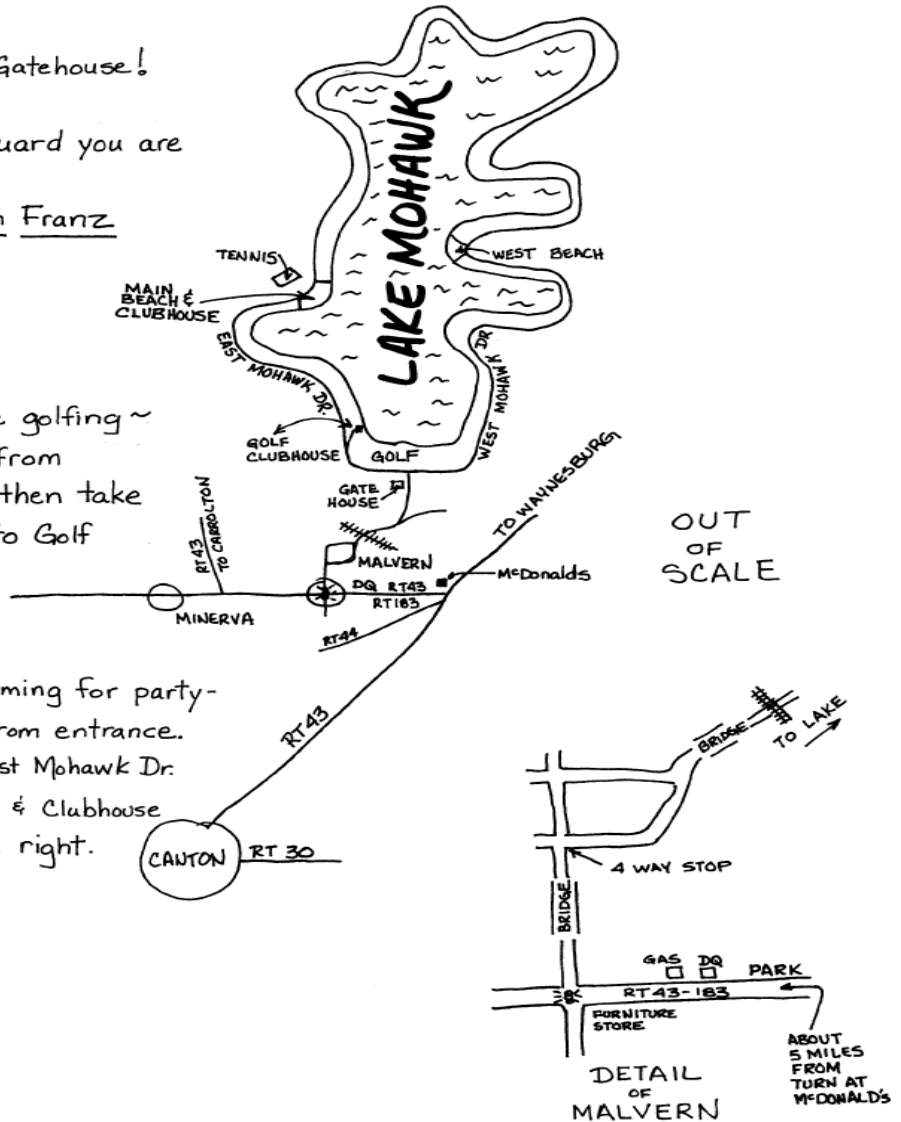

CMSC Delegate Report
March 18, 2008

While the CMSC Whistler group enjoys mid-March skiing and the TSC-Snowmass/Aspen travel contingent prepares for departure, I will take a little bit of my place in space to thank those who volunteer to be trip leaders for ALL ski trips. The pay is lousy, the opportunity for difficulties is high, and the “feel good” rewards are questionable. The fact that 24 CMSC clubs continue to draw people interested in being trip leaders either means that there are a lot of masochistic people in the world or that these people really enjoy performing the task. Over the years, I have run a lot of trips. 99% were extremely enjoyable. I’d like to relate a little of my experience with running the CMSC Crested Butte trip this year to show you how challenging things can get for a trip leader. I will leave personalities out of this and concentrate only on the challenges presented by weather and ‘Untied’ Airlines.

Let me start by saying that the skiing was GREAT! We had more snow than I have ever seen in Crested Butte. Fifty-five people from 10 CMSC clubs joined me on this trip. Most left from Cleveland, 10 left from Akron, 2 from Dallas, and 2 met us at CB. At 4AM on departure day, I was informed that ‘Untied’ Airlines had cancelled CAK flight. Fortunately, Frontier stepped in to cover that minor set back. In Cleveland, 2 e-ticketed passengers were told that they needed “paper tickets” in order to travel. We solved that by having them BUY other tickets with the promise that I would get their money back somehow. Our plane was overweight trying to leave Denver, so we had to dump some people. They were lucky! They got ‘comps’ for the inconvenience. We finally left Denver, only to return because our destination airport was snowed in! We returned to Denver. ‘Untied’ Air cancelled our flight and tried to brush us under the rug. Busses weren’t running! Mountain passes were closed. ‘Untied’ wasn’t willing to do anything until I spoke to some supervisors. We got discount rooms at Doubletree and they added a flight for the next day so that we could get to our destination. We arrived, checked in, partied, skied the next 4 days and had fun.

On departure day, we were leaving at the same time as Detroit Ski Council. Our bus arrived, (albeit, too small for all of us and luggage), Detroit’s did not. Their bus driver had a heart attack going to his bus. Crowds at Gunnison made our departure late. The CAK group missed their flight from Denver, but, once again, Frontier stepped in to save their day. The large group had to wait for ‘Untied’ to decide that they would “hold” our ORD to CLE plane until we got there. There weren’t many happy people on that flight besides us! We finally made it to CLE, only to find that all the baggage handlers had gone HOME because it was after midnight. An hour and a half later, we finally got our luggage. What a relief! What’s that? Our skis are still in Chicago???? A final trip to an ‘Untied’ office got paperwork filled out so that all skis could be delivered to our homes the next day.

My hair has gotten ‘grayer’. It took me a week to get back to normal. I never want to see an ‘Untied’ Airline’s plane, ticket agent, or supervisor EVER!

Please thank your trip leaders for volunteering their time and energy.

Call to Order

 - Mike Wile attended the Mountain Travel Symposium in Vail this year. Interest has been voiced for a trip to Mammoth/Big Sky so he gathered all the info he could on those areas as well as some possible smaller/short week trips. These include Salt Lake Safari, Summit County (Keystone, Copper Mtn, A Basin Breckinridge), and Schweitzer Mtn in upstate Idaho. If you have any suggestions/interests in future trips, please let the Club know at the spring party.

- **New Business:**
 - **CMSC Report:** Jim Kovach, our CMSC Representative, reported on the following items. CMSC Golf Outing is scheduled for July 19. They would like a team from TSCS to participate. There are still spots open on the Thanksgiving Cruise. For more information on any of these events see Jim's full report or the CMSC website.

Snowmass / Aspen Trip Recap

Where do I start? A great trip, fantastic conditions, and 46 fellow travelers who were fun, gracious, and easy to work for & with. It started bright and early Saturday morning. We all arrived at the airport in plenty of time, and found out that 2 more skiers from Goodyear were lucky enough to get on our flight. Yes, they were 2 of 10 on my waiting list that knew the chances of getting on my trip were slim to none. What Jim and Esther found out the day before our flight was that because the ski club was on the flight, Frontier was bringing in a bigger plane to accommodate all of us and our luggage. As a result, we had plenty of space on the plane to spread out, and no worries of any luggage being left behind. But, before we ever even all were checked in and thru security, Paul had a bloody nose, and Cynthia lost her license! Wow, was that a sign of what was to come – I surely hoped not! Eventually, 45 of us got on the plane, (we will meet our 46th traveler in Aspen) and were ready to take off on time, but the captain told us the plane had to get a bath in De-Icing liquid. We would be about 20 minutes late leaving, but those 20 minutes were made up in the sky and we landed in Denver on time.

Once in Denver, everyone waited on their luggage. Soon it came and GREAT, everyone got their luggage and skis. While everyone was waiting, it was a good time for everyone to get to know everyone else on the trip. As we waited on the bus to come to pick us up at the designated charter bus pick up area, everyone was already organizing the luggage, and taking group pictures. On the trip, there were 12 members from other ski clubs, and by the time everyone got on the bus, those 12 members were made to feel very welcome on our club trip. As the luggage was loaded on the bus, with everyone pitching in to help the driver, we managed to get every last piece of luggage under the bus! Wow, that was some job of organization by the club members and the bus driver. Once we are loaded, we are off to the first stop of the day – Applejacks and King Super! The driver told me to tell everyone 30 minutes and that way everyone would be done in 45 minutes. Much to his surprise and mine, everyone was done in 35 minutes. We had beverages, munchies for the ski week and food for lunch. Next stop, Snowmass.

As we traveled thru the foothills, off in the distance, it became quite apparent that we were going to have a great week of skiing. As we arrived at the Eisenhower tunnel, the Loveland ski area had lots of snow and few skiers. The same seemed to be true as we passed Copper Mountain and Vail. 3 ½ hours after we left the stores, we were in the Snowmass Village waiting for our escort to the hotel. After about 10 minutes, the Snowmass Police arrived to escort the bus to the hotel on the mountain. Since there is so much construction going on in Snowmass now, all buses have to be escorted either by the hotel / condo complex or the police. Not a problem, as soon as the police arrived we started climbing up to the hotel. Once we arrived at the hotel, check-in time was still 2 hours away. Not to worry, the hotel had about half of the rooms ready and the hotel manager worked with the cleaning staff to get all the other rooms done as fast as possible. As some of us waited on their rooms to be ready, everyone got to know each other better in the hotel bar, or some even went out and checked out the Snowmass Mall to purchase new ski boots. Also meeting us at the hotel was our 46th traveler, Joe.

The hotel sponsored a wine and cheese party for us Saturday evening. At this party, 2 representatives from Aspen / Snowmass came and talked about all 4 ski resorts as well as other activities that were going on during the week. After they were done, door prizes were awarded.

Sunday arrived, and it was time to ski. Much to my surprise, as I arrived for breakfast at 7 AM, I found just all of my entire fellow skiers were up and ready to hit the slopes. Seems like we all had the same sickness – time change! Everyone was up very early, so no reason not to hit the slopes. After everyone was done with breakfast, it was time to get ready to go skiing. Be outside the hotel and ready to ski at 8:15. That was the goal. After all, the slopes opened at 8:30 and we needed to be the first ones in line. As we had learned the previous evening, it was Disabled Veterans week in Snowmass, and it would be better to be up the Village Express lift early.

By 8:15, most of our club was outside the hotel and ready to take the walk down the driveway to the slopes. As everyone reminded each other, ski to the big pile of snow at the end of the day, that's where the driveway to the hotel is. Mind you, that big pile of snow was probably 15 feet high. Kind of hard to miss, but if you did, ski back to the lift, and ride the shuttle (looks like 3 gondola cars connected together) back up and ski back down to the pile again! Most everyone skied at Snowmass the first day. The morning started out cloudy, but with great skiing conditions. There were plenty of groomed runs as well as un-groomed glade skiing for everyone. A few hearty soles decided to see what the sign at the end of the Elk Camp lift meant by 'Short but Strenuous' hike to ski Long Shot, the longest run in Snowmass. I from what I hear, everyone who took the hike might have a different message to put on the sign at the end of the lift! As the afternoon wore on, the morning's weather report, which had left us wondering just how accurate they are at forecasting weather in Aspen, became apparent that they are pretty accurate. After all, how many times have we heard there's a Winter Storm Warning and nothing happens. It started snowing and by the time everyone was in the hot tubs, we were starting to believe the forecast of 20 inches of snow was going to be very accurate! Many took time to go to the ski shops to rent powder skis. Little did they know how much they were going to need those skis.

Monday morning brought us about 13 inches of fresh powder at the hotel and at the top of the mountain, 20+ inches. Wow, everyone was excited to get on the slopes. After another good breakfast served by the hotel, it was time to get out on the slopes. A few chose to go to Aspen and Buttermilk to ski today, and the rest chose to stay in Snowmass to tackle the snow. Everyone seemed to be having a great time in the powder, I might add, I seen lots of pictures of people laying in the 20 inches, including the trip leader! But, to one of our travelers, laying in 20 inches of powder wasn't so kind. Herta broke her leg over in the Elk Camp on Monday. I want to thank everyone who helped Herta the rest of the week, including the biggest thanks to Sue, her roomie. THANKS SUE!!! Other than Herta, I heard lots of 'today was a great day', and 'today was a fun, but a hard day'. Being from the Midwest, we don't get to ski in 20 inches of fresh snow, and most of that fell after they had groomed! It proved to be an interesting day for most. After skiing, again everyone was at the hot tubs to enjoy another hour or so of soaking. The hotel had 2 hot tubs as well as a pool that as most people found out during the week that was bath water warm! Monday evening sent people to Aspen and Snowmass to dinner. Riding the bus to Aspen for dinner wasn't an issue. Some of us had to pay, and others got to ride for free. Depends on your age! The bus to Aspen for dinner picked everyone up right out the hotel front door. Can't get any more convenient than that! For those who did go to Aspen for dinner, most were lucky on the way back to Snowmass to see the reason Snowmass is closing the week after we left. ELK and I mean many ELK. They were everywhere. As a ski patroller told one of our skiers, Elk Camp got its name for a reason. Migrating elk and skiers don't mix.

Tuesday and Wednesday brought us sunny days. Again, each day, we had skiers going to Aspen, Buttermilk, Aspen Highlands and some just choosing to stay at Snowmass. For everyone not skiing at Snowmass, the hotel shuttled everyone to the ski bus stop every day. Not that it was far, only 1.5 blocks, but it was up hill. The hotel even did that when the Snowmass Village bus stop was across the street from the hotel. The Stonebridge Inn staff was wonderful to everyone on our trip. I know that everyone on the trip would stay at this hotel again, and would recommend this hotel to anyone going to Aspen / Snowmass. Each day at the hot tub there were stories of the skiing day, as well as a check to see if anyone else was injured. Each day, I was grateful to get a no injury today report!

Thursday morning brought us another day of morning sun. But, the weather reports were telling us the sun wasn't going to last. Sure enough, by lunch time, it was getting very cloudy and shortly after, it began falling again. This time, so heavy at times it was hard to see the chair lift in front of you. As the weather worsened, it became apparent that the report of 8 inches of new snow wasn't going to be wrong. As I sat in the restaurant at lunch time, more and more of the ski club began to show up. Snow covered and smiling at all the new snow. After lunch, everyone went their own way again on the slopes. As it continued to snow, everyone was having a great time in the powder. Even on what was going to be my last run down Elk Camp was so much fun that when Mark, Deb and I got down to the lift, it looked like the snow was going to give up and the sun come out. So, we decided to go up one more time, man was that a mistake!

By the time we got to the top, we couldn't even see the chair in front of us. We were wondering how we would know when we were at the top! When we got close, we could hear the lift, and then we could see the building. We got off the lift, and there were 3 other skiers standing there talking about how they were going to have to stay close to each other and feel their way down the mountain. For all of you who have never, ever skied the Elk Camp area, it is an area with wide open ski runs, but lots of trees. The last thing we wanted to do was to run into a tree well we couldn't see. I know John, Jason, Pete and Sue know how difficult it is to get someone out of a tree well when you have a base of 110 inches of snow! By 4 PM, most everyone was off the mountain, wondering exactly how much more snow we were going to get. Thursday evening brought 15 of us to the Hoffman condo to watch the OSU vs. UMASS basketball game. Even the pizza delivery guy got into the game with us!

Friday was our last day on the slopes. Even more fresh powder. About 5 inches on top of what we had gotten yesterday afternoon. At breakfast the big decision was where to ski. It was sunny outside and some people went to Aspen, some to Aspen Highlands and some to Buttermilk. It was a day for star spotting on the slopes. Those of us who skied at Snowmass on Friday, we got to see stars at the end of the driveway as we put on our skis to go to the lift. There were the Disabled Veterans skiing in a race. The race operators asked us to us cheer them on, and we all did loudly. They were the real stars! But, some of us were lucky enough to see Reese Witherspoon, while others spent time trying to find her photo shoot on the mountain! Each day at Snowmass, they have what they call a noon groom. This day's noon groom happened to be off the lift that goes to one of the highest points on the mountain. At noon, most everyone who was skiing at Snowmass that day was up the High Alpine chairlift to ski Green Cabin. But, for a few, once they got up the chair, the lure of hiking on up the slope to ski fresh powder from the night before was too great. Off they went, while others hiked to the groomed run. Both groups had a great run down the mountain. For those at the other resorts, they also had a great sunny day of skiing on groomed runs as well as un-groomed fresh powder runs. Friday afternoon, again it was time to hit the hot tub for one last soak. Friday evening everyone scattered all over for dinner. Some stayed in Snowmass for the fireworks on the slopes while others went to Aspen for shopping and dinner.

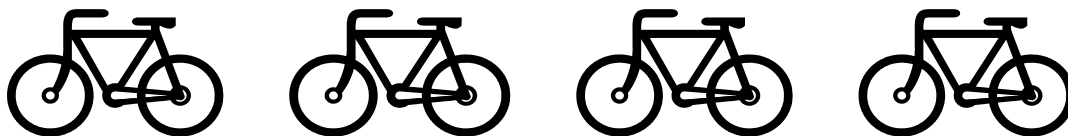

By going skiing in April, you can not only save money, but get good skiing conditions as well as no lift lines. Don't pass up a good trip just because it is going in April. You will be surprised!

I want to thank everyone on the trip for being on time, helping each other out, and making my job very easy. Also, BIG THANKS to our tour operator, Beyond Boundaries. Again, they came through with a wonderful trip for our ski club, without any issues. I believe this trip is one of the only ones this year that didn't have any flight issues, luggage issues, bus issues or hotel issues. That is a credit to the tour operator making sure all the details are taken care of. I also want to thank the members on the trip from other ski clubs for choosing to go to Snowmass with The Timken Company Ski Club. We enjoyed having you on the trip and hope you come back again. If I miss a club, I am sorry, we had people on the trip from Goodyear, Hi-Rise, Erie, Erie Shores and Warren ski clubs.
